BC Farm Museum Celebrates 50 years

50 years ago on November 19th the BC Farm Museum was opened by the Right Honorable Lord Mayor of London, Mr. Robert Bellinger, accompanied by Lieutenant Governor Pearkes, Premier W.A.C. Bennett, and Reeve Poppy. It was the fulfillment of many years of planning and fund raising by many local industry leaders and UBC professors. *We have acquired a video of the occasion*!!

Reading over 50 years of Directors' Meetings minutes we discovered there have been the same four challenging issues consistently and repeatedly discussed and needing action from the beginning. 1) Lack of exhibit space 2) Lack of funds 3) Acquisition and deaccession policy 4) Leaky roof

In 1990 Federal funding dried up for paid staff and the museum changed to total volunteer management and operation. The predictions of its demise or dissolution were frequent. Yet today the museum still operates - - and thrives. *Today's successes are built on the shoulders of those who faithfully volunteered before us!*

Volunteers built a parade float to publicize our anniversary this year. It attended a number of community events. Souvenir mugs and pins are for sale in the museum gift shop. Anniversary pens are a gift to anyone who donates "cash" to the *butter churn*! Garnet Farm has allowed us to place a covered wagon in their pasture at the approach to Fort Langley. An exhibit showing the high lights of each decade of the Museum's existence will be on display in the museum.

A **Dinner Celebration** with entertainment and silent auction will be the finale to this year's celebrations. This happens on *Saturday, November 12th* at the Fort Langley Community Hall! Get your tickets early as there is limited seating.



Vancouver Foundation Endowment Fund

Who knew?? Who remembers??

In 1985 the Farm Museum Board of Directors established an Endowment Fund with the Vancouver Foundation. Raising funds for museum operation has always been a challenge. The Directors of the day wisely thought to establish an Endowment Fund which would generate yearly interest income to go towards museum operating expenses. They raised \$10,000 for this purpose which became the initial capital in the fund.

Over the years Mr. Don Merkley, a past president, added a total of \$3000 to that fund. He donated \$250 to the fund in memoriam of his friends and fellow volunteers whenever one passed away. The fund now stand at \$13,000.

According to past Directors' Meeting minutes the Directors at that time had planned to add \$25,000 to the fund each of the following three years. They were unable to accomplish this.

With today's interest rates this fund currently generates between \$600 and \$700 yearly to the museum coffers.

It has been a busy time researching images to guide the artists and then going over sketches submitted to make sure the finished mural will be as accurate as possible.

There is often more to a pioneer scene than meets the eye. When one attempts to capture that scene in a mural, we wanted to 'get it right' so that our more senior visitors, when viewing the finished work, would be taken back to earlier times and say "yes, I remember that".

Our artists will be painting on very expensive Crezon[©] panels and most of these panels have been picked up or delivered to their respective studios so they can work in comfort and in familiar surroundings. Some of the painting is now underway and this will continue through the fall of 2016.

Our volunteers at the Farm Museum will be preparing the mounting materials at the site of each mural so when the artists are finished we can get the panels back and start installing them. This will take place during our 'closed period' this winter.

We will keep you posted on plans for a grand unveiling late next spring/early summer of 2017 of the completed work.

This artwork, by these outstanding artists, will add that 'extra touch' to our museum and will be reason enough to bring your out-of town guests visit our wonderful Farm Museum over and over again.

Thanks to everyone that came to help on BC Day. We had a great day and made lots of new friends! Everyone enjoyed the trains provided by Duane Rose and friends. We had a good display outside with our float, tractor, display wagon, ModelT, and the Fraser Valley Antique Engines out front and all of our active displays running inside. Some of the guests took advantage of our new IDP system and commented favourably. Our donations and volunteer support compare well with Canada Day, so it was a definitely a success!

Hold The Presses!!



The **Interactive Display Program** is coming along albeit somewhat slowly. The projected media is being regularly displayed by some members and there are several active QR code signs for guests to make use of. The media server and wireless routers are stable and active. We have finally be able to contract a web designer to help set up the content management system and the initial work will be completed by the end of October. This will give a base media content load, templates and basic training on how to grow our program. Once this work is done, we can start using the kiosk terminals. At some point next year, we will be able to explore setting up the Supersign monitor network, as well. This is an extensive system that will have to be phased in and grown over time, as volunteer resources allow. Once it is all active, we will have the most unique multi-media presentation system around, with the ability to support future ideas as they come up.
