Around the Museum updates:



- Young Canada Works program informed us that we were <u>denied</u> funding for a summer student. This will make staffing the museum this summer a bit of a challenge. - Grace hosted a Volunteer Orientation session and 8 members attended. She created a Handbook and incorporated suggestions emailed to her. There is a copy in the office and this is a great resource for those new to the office procedures.
- VERY GOOD news Karen Long informed Grace that we have been approved by the Department of Canadian Heritage for \$4000 towards Celebrating Canada Day this year!!

<u>Interactive display system:</u>

Ongoing projects of Todd and Bill - creating and entering data for the project. It starts with selecting an artifact, a picture is taken and if possible a movie of it being used. Then Bill will look up the history sometimes using the work others. After gathering all the necessary information, a file is made and downloaded into the museum's server, then entered into the display software for the tablets.

QR coding:

Using some of the video footage procured for the interactive system, the video is altered and stored on the museum's server. Bill then builds a QR code, prints it out and it is affixed to the artifact. Then with a smart phone connected to our Wi-Fi in the museum members and visitors can scan the QR code and watch the video on a smart phone.

Use of the 4 TV units:

With these TV sets we have software which will let us produce various displays and they will be played on the TV sets automatically. This system is still under way, and so far, we can produce signage on the TV's using a USB drive, but will eventually be able to connect them through our local networking system.

From the <u>Mechanical Workshop</u> a 1947 Pony tractor and a 1950's Ferguson tractor went through a restoration process and are on display and hopefully make their debut in upcoming May Day parade. The <u>paint booth</u> was donated by the Brick Warehouse and used in their facility for furniture repair. It was installed and used for priming and painting the Ferguson hood and grill assembly.









Another beautiful artifact that was painstakingly restored by member Brad Ross, is this Maytag Washing Machine. Brad has an affinity for old washing machines and it shows.
